

With her daily physical therapy, Hope showed increasing range of motion and although she may always have some physical limitations, she never lets that get in the way of having fun. She happily dances and plays fetch, all with a big and adorable smile, giving kisses to everyone she meets. When it came time for Hope to find her special family, it didn't take long. Within days of being placed on the adoption floor, her new mom and dad fell in love at first sight and were smitten.

Hope deserved love, and she found it through your support of the Potter League for Animals, and in the loving embrace of her new adoptive family.

### **Higgins:**

As soon as we heard about the thousands of animals living in squalid conditions on the tenant farm in Westport, Massachusetts, we knew we had to help. Higgins' body was matted, he was in poor health, and his world had been cold and empty.

Once Higgins healed, it didn't take long before his personality caught the heart of his adoptive mom and new rabbit sister, Beans. Higgins is now living a cage-free, "house bun" life with all kinds of toys to chew on, toss and dig at, including a cardboard castle. ### Potter League Strengthens Mission

Spaying or neutering companion animals is the most effective method to curbing the pet overpopulation problem and the Potter League for Animals has been supportive of this strategy for decades. When the Rhode Island Community Spay/Neuter Clinic opened its doors over 10 years ago, it was a coordinated effort by animal welfare leaders in Rhode Island to combat companion animal overpopulation in Rhode Island. 60,000 surgeries later, the Clinic has proven itself to be an invaluable asset to all those who are dedicated to the well-being of companions in our state and beyond.

In order to support this important program and continue its success, this spring, the Potter League acquired the Rhode Island Community Spay/Neuter Clinic, now known as the Potter League Spay & Neuter Clinic. The Clinic, located in Warwick, will continue to be accessible to communities across Rhode Island, Massachusetts and Connecticut. Our services at the Clinic will continue to focus on spay and neuter surgery, and remain subsidized for individuals who need a reduced cost service and other animal welfare organizations. All of the staff have transitioned to become Potter League team members.

The Clinic was recently assessed by the leading national agency for training and assessing spay and neuter clinics. They gave the Clinic a glowing review, and we will continue to adhere to the highest standards, protocols and procedures to ensure each animal's safety and comfort during their stay with us at our Animal Care and Adoption Center and at our Clinic. Our vision is to help more people care for their pets by assisting those in need



of medical and other pet services. We know that through prevention, spay and neuter and public education, we can save more lives.

The Clinic is the keystone that animal welfare progress has been built upon in Rhode Island for over a decade, and we are proud to have taken on the stewardship of this vital institution so the important work being done here can continue long into the future.

It is because of your continued support of the Potter League that we are able to move forward and reach those who need our help in Rhode Island and beyond. Without you, none of these successes would be possible.
