

Coming Together During A Tragedy



Gravy and her sister Turkey were huddled into a tight ball together, shivering on the side of a road Thanksgiving morning. It was unclear how long they had been there, but it was evident they had been mistreated for a long time.

Found by good samaritans walking their dogs in the area, they were painfully thin and dirty. Both Gravy and Turkey were extraordinarily lethargic and emaciated. Diagnostic tests showed Turkey was suffering from liver failure. After she suffered a hypoglycemic seizure, Turkey's body went into shock, and she could not recover. Sadly, she was humanely euthanized. Once stable, Gravy received a complete medical evaluation

and a treatment plan to nurse her safely back to a healthy weight, receiving the best care possible.

Gravy and Turkey were the victims of severe neglect and suffered immensely, yet they remained full of love and trust. In just days, we saw hope return to Gravy's eyes. She finally knew what it was like to be loved and would crawl into anyone's lap, nuzzling for extra pets.

The community came together to give Gravy a better life, and one of the kind women who found her on the side of the road gave Gravy, now named Gracy, her new loving home.
