## Second Beach Survivor

Mabel, a Bluetick Coonhound, was found emaciated, with severe muscle wasting, sores, and scars all over her body at Second Beach in Middletown. Our team created a comprehensive plan to help her get healthy. The plan included a nutritious diet, regular medical check-ups, and a behavior modification plan.

Our veterinary team created a feeding schedule that allowed Mabel to eat small, frequent meals throughout the day, which helped her body absorb the nutrients she needed without getting sick from overeating. She was also provided with regular medical check-ups and closely monitored to ensure she gained weight.

Mabel's behavior was quite challenging. She was obsessed with food, linked to her past experiences. In a foster home, she would search for food for hours, attempt to escape through windows, and become focused on cupboards and the refrigerator's ice machine. Our staff knew Mabel needed a specialized behavior modification plan to help her feel safe in a home environment.

Over time, our team's plan for Mabel showed promising results. She became more comfortable with people, approached them voluntarily, and learned to take treats from their hands gently. After four months in our care, we found the perfect home for her.

Mabel's new family had the patience and understanding to help her overcome her anxiety and obsession. With time, she settled into her new environment and became a much more relaxed and contented dog. Mabel's story is a reminder of the resilience and strength of animals who have been through challenging times. With patience, love, and the right care, animals can overcome their challenges and find a happy and fulfilling life. The support of our community made it possible to provide the veterinary and behavioral care Mabel needed to start her new life.



### **B-Mod Grads:**

Our Behavior Team supports our animals by ensuring that both our shelter animals and animals in our foster homes receive enrichment and behavior training. By supporting their mental well being — and with the help of generous donors — dozens of dogs and cats "graduated" from the B-Mod program in 2023. Dogs and cats like Stoli and Riley got the expert training they needed to blossom and transform.

### Riley

Riley is a cat with a history of severe biting towards his previous owner, which made him a challenging case for the behavior team. However, with the help of our medical team, it was discovered that Riley was hard of hearing, which explained his tendency to react

aggressively when startled or surprised. Once we made accommodations to ensure Riley was not caught off guard, he quickly became a loving and affectionate feline. Eventually, Riley found his new home with a wonderful family, and even gained a dog friend! Riley's success story serves as a reminder that with patience, understanding, and the right support, even cats with challenging issues can thrive in loving homes.



### Stoli

Stoli was found as a stray with no previous history. A beautiful but exuberant dog, Stoli needed a lot of guidance and structure. One of the biggest challenges she faced was her tendency to use her mouth to get what she wanted. This behavior had to be modified

through a combination of positive reinforcement and training. However, Stoli's good nature and ability to get along with other dogs were major assets in her rehabilitation. She slowly learned to trust people and became more confident in her interactions with them. With a lot of support, Stoli became a well-behaved and loving dog who found a loving family after four months in our care.

## Mighty Mouse

Mouse is a beautiful all-white 9-year-old cat who loves exploring novel places with her mom. They once went on a road trip, taking in all the sights and sounds. Mouse loved every moment, from the fresh air to the new smells.

But upon their return home, Mouse's mom noticed that Mouse was not her usual self. She had stopped eating and began vomiting excessively. Her mom grew increasingly worried and knew that something was wrong. However, she knew that an emergency veterinarian was out of reach financially.
