Dear Potter League Friends.

Every day, an interdisciplinary group of staff walks through the entire Potter League Animal Care Center, makes eye contact with every animal, and asks themselves, 'What do you need from us today to make your stay more comfortable and to find your way home?' That group consists of veterinary staff, behavior staff, our foster coordinator, and animal care leadership. Every day, every animal.

At the Potter League, our standards for ourselves are high, and we will never let an animal go unseen or without the care and comforts they need for even one day. Recently, many of our board members had the opportunity to come into the Animal Care Center in the morning to feed, clean, and care for animals alongside our staff and volunteers. The board members came away with a new understanding and respect for the hard work it takes to care of an average of 90 animals every day.

Some animals need basic care like vaccines, food, water, and love. Some need much more. Like Mouse, at just three months old, Mouse was diagnosed with a life-threatening heart condition called patent ductus arteriosus, PDA, a defect that caused her heart to enlarge and left her future uncertain. Without urgent surgery, Mouse wouldn't have had the chance at the life she deserves.

Tiny, fragile, and full of quiet determination, Mouse quickly captured the hearts of everyone at the Potter League. Though she faced an uphill battle, she never lost her spark — wagging her tail gently at staff, cuddling close to her foster, and leaning into every bit of comfort offered.

Thanks to the critical care she received and the support of those who believed in her, Mouse underwent lifesaving heart surgery and went to a volunteer foster home for recovery. While she will likely need extra attention from a cardiac specialist for the remainder of her life, Mouse was ready for a new home and attended Yappy Hour with her foster family, where she met the guests and her forever family. Her new family are long time Potter League monthly donors and animal lovers.

We were able to help Mouse because our community supports the needs of homeless animals. In this report, you will read about the Potter League's accomplishments over the past year. Every animal helped, every home found, every pet fed, and every family kept whole was enabled by you, the people in our community who care and support those with no one else to turn to. Thank you for being there for Mouse and the thousands of animals who depend on the Potter League every year.



honoring the life & LEGACY OF ROXANN PRESS

Roxann Press lived a life shaped by compassion, generosity, and a deep love for animals. For more than twenty-five years, Roxann was a steady and devoted presence at the Potter League—giving her time, care, and quiet dedication to animals and the people who love them.

Long before making Rhode Island her home, Roxann and her late husband, Bob, were rescuing, fostering, and advocating for animals through their local humane society in New York. Their home was often filled with dogs, cats, puppies, and kittens in need of care, safety, and love. Helping animals wasn't something they did occasionally—it was simply the way they lived.

When Roxann settled in Portsmouth, she naturally found her way to the Potter League. She began by

caring for cats and fostering kittens, later becoming one of our most dedicated adoption follow-up volunteers. Roxann called every adopter—asking how their new family member was doing, listening to their stories, and sharing in their joy. When she couldn't reach someone, she would send a handwritten note, just to let them know we cared. Through these thoughtful connections, Roxann helped families feel supported long after adoption day and strengthened the bond between the Potter League and the community we serve.

In 2012, Roxann Press received the Lore Owens Volunteer Award, which honors volunteers whose long-standing, behind-the-scenes service reflects extraordinary commitment and care. The award recognized what so many already knew—that Roxann showed up consistently, worked quietly, and gave wholeheartedly. Even when she could no longer volunteer in person, her devotion to animals never wavered.

A proud member of the Forever Friends Society, Roxann ensured that her compassion for animals would extend far beyond her lifetime. Her extraordinary legacy gift of \$2.9 million to the Potter League's endowment stands as an enduring investment in our mission and our future. By strengthening the endowment, her generosity provides lasting stability, allowing us to plan responsibly and meet the evolving needs of animals and the community we serve.

Roxann understood that caring for animals—and the human-animal bond—requires ongoing commitment. As the cost of veterinary care, shelter operations, and community-based programs continues to rise, the support of our donors remains as essential as ever. Her legacy gift ensures that the Potter League will be here for years to come, while the generosity of our community allows us to meet the needs of animals today.

Roxann's legacy is one of quiet generosity, steady kindness, and deep belief in this work. Because of her foresight and compassion—and the continued support of those who share her values—the Potter League will remain a vital resource for animals and the community we love.

ABOUT US & OUR IMPACT

Founded in 1929 as the Newport County League for Animals, the Potter League for Animals was created to respond to the needs of animals who were abandoned, injured, or suffering—and to promote more humane treatment throughout the community. Nearly a century later, that commitment remains at the heart of our work, even as the landscape of animal welfare has evolved dramatically.

Today, the Potter League for Animals serves as Rhode Island's most comprehensive animal care and resource center, providing shelter, veterinary care, behavior and training support, spay and neuter services, humane education, and critical owner-assistance programs. Guided by our mission—as the heart of a compassionate community, we enrich lives and promote the humane treatment of animals—we supported 13,896 animals last year through 39,038 services delivered across the state.

Our Animal Care and Adoption Center in Middletown, Rhode Island is an open-admission shelter, meaning we never turn away a pet in need from the communities we serve. Each year, approximately 2,000 dogs, cats, rabbits, and small animals come through our doors, including animals facing housing instability, changing life circumstances, or community displacement, as well as stray animals from the municipalities with which we partner. Our commitment goes beyond sheltering—every animal receives individualized medical and behavioral care designed to support their well-being and future success.

Our work is grounded in the belief that the best outcomes happen when pets can remain with the people who love them. Thousands of families turn to the Potter League each year for guidance, resources, and support—whether they're navigating training challenges, accessing food or veterinary care, searching for a lost pet, facing housing or financial instability, or simply trying to do right by an animal

they love during moments of transition, hardship, and uncertainty. Our Pet Food Pantry distributes tens of thousands of pounds of food annually to households across Rhode Island, and our Pet Safe program provides temporary care for animals whose guardians are navigating crisis, including hospitalization, housing insecurity, or domestic violence.

Access to veterinary care remains a cornerstone of this work. Since 2010, the Potter League Spay & Neuter Clinic in Warwick has performed more than 99,000 subsidized surgeries, helping reduce overpopulation and improve long-term outcomes for animals throughout Rhode Island and neighboring communities. These services play a vital role in prevention—supporting families before challenges escalate and animals are at risk of displacement.

Education, collaboration, and community partnership are central to our approach. Through humane education programs and strong partnerships with local and statewide organizations, we work to strengthen the human-animal bond and create lasting change. Our Community Navigator program—Rhode Island's first animal-focused social worker role—helps individuals and families navigate complex systems and access support across human service agencies. By meeting people where they are, this program focuses on one guiding goal: keeping pets and families together whenever possible.

As a highly respected and nationally recognized nonprofit, the Potter League for Animals remains deeply rooted in the community it serves. We are proud of the impact we make and deeply grateful to the donors, volunteers, partners, and advocates who make this work possible. With compassion, accountability, and trust guiding every decision, we move forward—ready to meet growing needs, respond to challenges, and remain a steady, vital resource for animals and the people who love them.

ELLIE'S *story*

Ellie arrived at the Animal Care Center as a stray, already blind and clearly in pain. What initially appeared to be cataracts was diagnosed as glaucoma in both eyes, a painful condition that had likely been affecting her for some time. Surgery wasn't just recommended; it was Ellie's chance at relief.

Ellie's path forward wasn't easy. Her pain led to complications that delayed her procedure, requiring careful stabilization before she could move ahead. Once ready, she successfully underwent surgery and received around-the-clock monitoring and pain management to help her through recovery.

The difference once Ellie was pain-free was undeniable. The dog who once cried and howled at the front of her kennel disappeared—replaced by a playful, joyful pup who bounced through her space, finally comfortable and at ease in her own body.

Ellie's journey reflects the heart of Shelter Medicine—meeting animals in pain with expertise and compassion, and giving them back the comfort, joy, and life they deserve.

ANIMAL CARE & ADOPTION

At the Potter League, adoption is about more than finding homes—it's about building the right relationships and setting animals up for long-term success. Every day, our Animal Care team works closely with each animal in our care, learning their individual needs, personalities, and histories, and creating an environment that prioritizes comfort, consistency, and well-being. Through thoughtful routines, enrichment, and attentive care, they help reduce stress and give each animal the time and space they need to settle, heal, and show who they truly are.

Our Customer Care team then guides adopters through the process with honesty, care, and open conversation—focusing on connection over perfection and thoughtful, informed matches. We know every animal comes with a story, and successful adoptions happen when people feel supported, prepared, and understood. Through individualized counseling, close collaboration with our Behavior and Shelter Medicine teams, and ongoing post-adoption support, we help ensure that animals—and the people who welcome them home—have the tools they need to thrive together.

DARBY'S *story*

Darby arrived at the Potter League on January 21, 2025, as part of a confiscation case involving unsafe, unsanitary living conditions. With limited socialization and signs of neglect, she entered our care fearful and overwhelmed, showing deep anxiety around new people, noises, and unfamiliar environments.

Recognizing that Darby needed time and patience, our team focused on helping her feel safe through quiet decompression spaces, treat-based introductions, and one-on-one support. Using reward-based training and gentle exposure, she learned to navigate daily routines, accept handling, and begin exploring the outdoors.


With consistent structure, enrichment, and the steady presence of dedicated volunteers, Darby continued to grow—gaining confidence, learning new cues, and choosing affection on her own terms.

On June 7, 2025, Darby was adopted by a family ready to meet her with patience, trust, and understanding. Soon after, her adopter shared the update we had hoped for: Darby is doing wonderfully well—and she knows she's home.

Darby's story is a reminder that when animals are given the time, care, and support they need, the results can be truly transformative.

FOSTER CARE

Foster care is one of the most vital parts of the Potter League's lifesaving work. It gives animals the time, space, and individualized care they need—outside of a shelter environment—to heal, grow, and prepare for what comes next. From neonatal kittens and nursing mothers to animals recovering from illness, injury, or stress, foster homes provide comfort and stability that can't be replicated in a kennel.

Every foster placement is different, but the impact is the same: animals are given a better chance. Foster care allows our team to respond quickly in urgent situations, expand our capacity, and meet animals where they are. Each placement is carefully supported through thoughtful matching, supplies, guidance, and ongoing staff support—made possible by compassionate foster families and dedicated staff working together to ensure success.

DOMINO'S *story*

For one tiny kitten named Domino, foster care wasn't just helpful—it was everything.

Domino arrived at the Potter League at just three days old with his littermates, transferred from the Pawtucket Animal Shelter. Their umbilical cords were still attached, and without a mother to care for them, the kittens were placed immediately into bottle-baby foster homes to give them the best possible chance.

Despite devoted care, one of Domino's littermates did not survive—an all-too-real reminder of how fragile neonatal kittens can be. Domino continued on as a single bottle baby, relying on the steady commitment of his caregivers to carry him forward.

That same day, a stray mother cat and her five kittens—remarkably the same age as Domino—arrived at the shelter. A foster home stepped up, and Domino was given the chance to grow up as part of a feline family. The mother cat accepted him, grooming and caring for him alongside her own kittens, while Domino continued supplemental bottle-feeding until he was ready for solid food.

Being part of a family changed everything. Domino gained the comfort, socialization, and connection so critical during those early weeks of life.

Domino's journey is a powerful reminder of what foster care makes possible. Because of a safe home, thoughtful coordination, and someone willing to say yes at exactly the right moment, a tiny kitten who could have easily been lost was given the chance to grow and thrive.

VOLUNTEERS making a *difference*

Volunteers are the lifeline of the Potter League for Animals. Their time, care, and commitment are woven into every part of our work—supporting animals, staff, and the community in ways both visible and behind the scenes. Quite simply, our mission would not be possible without them.

Across our programs and facilities, volunteers play an essential role in animal care, adoption support, fostering, training, humane education, events, and operations. They walk dogs, socialize cats, assist with enrichment and recovery, support foster caregivers, and help ensure that animals experience consistency, comfort, and connection while in our care.

Volunteers are often the steady, familiar faces animals come to trust. Their patience and presence help reduce stress, build confidence, and create calmer environments—especially for animals who need extra reassurance or time. Beyond the shelter, volunteers extend our reach into the community by supporting pet food distribution, education programs, and outreach efforts that keep pets and families together.



Our Behavior & Training Center supports both the animals in our care and pets in the community, focusing on emotional well-being, communication, and thoughtful guidance. Through shelter-based programs like playgroups and individualized behavior support, alongside public offerings including group classes, private consultations, pre-adoption counseling, follow-up support, and community education, our team helps animals—and the people who care for them—build understanding, confidence, and connection.

SANDER'S *story*

From the moment Sanders entered our care—transferred from another local shelter after months in a loud, chaotic environment—it was clear he had big feelings, boundless curiosity, and tremendous potential. What he needed most was patience, understanding, and the right kind of support. In a kennel setting, Sanders struggled to settle. His excitement often masked the thoughtful, capable dog underneath, making it difficult for adopters to see who he truly was.

Our Behavior team met Sanders with consistency and care, providing outlets for his energy, opportunities to engage his mind, and time to learn how to navigate a busy world. There were no quick fixes—just daily effort, encouragement, and belief. Slowly, Sanders began to find his footing, pause, and connect.

With the right guidance in place and an adopter ready to understand his needs, Sanders was matched with a family willing to continue the journey alongside him. Given the chance to be understood, he was finally able to show the dog he had been all along.

Sanders' story reflects the heart of our Behavior & Training program—meeting animals where they are and giving them the support they need to move forward. HUMANE EDUCATION

Our Humane Education program helps nurture empathy, kindness, and respect for animals—often through hands-on experiences that stay with children long after the day ends. During Camp Happy Tails, our summer day camp for kids who love animals, campers spend their days learning about care, compassion, and what it means to truly see the animals around them.

One activity in particular captured this beautifully. Each camper was given a pet diary and invited to sit near a shelter animal, imagining what that animal might be thinking, feeling, or dreaming. For twenty minutes or more each day, campers wrote reflections filled with care and concern: "I feel sad," "I hope I get adopted soon," and "I'm dreaming about my new family."

One camper with special needs found writing difficult, but she eagerly asked each day when it would be time to work on her pet diary. When camp ended, she continued returning to the shelter—day after day—until the animal she bonded with was adopted.

Moments like this reflect the heart of Humane Education: creating space for connection, understanding, and compassion to take root. When children are given the chance to slow down and truly see animals, empathy becomes something they don't just learn—it's something they carry with them.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

The Potter League's Community Programs are rooted in the belief that caring for animals begins with supporting the people who love them. These programs focus on keeping pets with their families by offering practical, judgment-free support during times of hardship, transition, or instability.

By providing food, preventive care, temporary housing during crises, and financial assistance for urgent veterinary needs, the Potter League helps remove barriers that too often put the human-animal bond at risk—ensuring pets can remain healthy, safe, and home.

This work is made possible through the collaboration of our Community Navigator, program teams, volunteers, and community partners, all working together to support families facing complex circumstances.

For one local veteran, the Potter League became a source of stability during an incredibly difficult chapter.

After years of military service and multiple deployments, the veteran faced a difficult transition back to civilian life marked by significant personal loss. Within a single year, he lost both his home and his marriage and found himself living on the streets of Providence with his dog, Bandit. Bandit, a 10-year-old English bulldog, was his constant companion. Determined to keep Bandit safe and cared for, the veteran often went without food himself to make sure his dog had what he needed.

After connecting with the Potter League at a community outreach event, he shared his fear of not being able to provide for Bandit. Through coordinated support—including food assistance and access to veterinary care—Bandit received the care he needed, and his guardian gained a sense of stability and relief.

Most meaningful was the reassurance that he no longer had to choose between his own survival and the well-being of the animal he loved. We are honored to support both ends of the leash and keep families together when it matters most.

SPAY & NEUTER *clinic*

Access to spay and neuter services is one of the most effective—and compassionate—ways to prevent animal overpopulation and keep pets healthy and in homes. For many families, however, the cost of surgery can be out of reach. The Potter League Spay & Neuter Clinic exists to close that gap, ensuring cost is never the reason an animal goes without essential care.

Since opening its doors in 2010, the clinic has performed more than 99,000 spay and neuter surgeries, preventing tens of thousands of unwanted litters and easing the strain on shelters, rescues, and communities across Rhode Island and beyond. Each surgery represents not just one animal, but countless others who will never be born into uncertainty.

The clinic serves a broad cross-section of the community—from pet guardians facing financial hardship to rescue organizations, animal control agencies, and Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR) groups working to humanely manage community cat populations. Providing affordable, high-volume care requires precision, efficiency, and deep commitment, and we are proud of the work happening here every day.

For one client, that commitment made all the difference.

After the sudden passing of his father, a man navigating health and mobility challenges found himself responsible for two beloved cats. With limited resources and overwhelming grief, he worried he wouldn't be able to move forward with their care. Through compassion and collaboration, the clinic team stepped in. Donated hard-sided carriers from a community member and grant-supported assistance made it possible for both cats to receive the surgeries they needed—at no cost to him. Moved to tears, he shared his gratitude, reminding us that this work is about more than procedures; it's about dignity, trust, and showing up when people need help most.

The Spay & Neuter Clinic's impact reaches far beyond its walls—protecting animal welfare, preserving the human-animal bond, and strengthening the community, one surgery at a time.



